3 Steps to Help You Find the Right School for Your Child

1 EXPLORE YOUR OPTIONS

Visit www.mnps.org/school-options to explore your school options. Find your zoned school using Zone Finder and learn additional information about each school's offerings by visiting school websites or by calling the Family Information Center at 615-259-INFO(4636).

2 VISIT SCHOOLS

Schools may be hosting either in-person or virtual events, like tours and online information sessions. Check the websites or social media channels of schools you're interested in to see how they plan to showcase their school and allow families to connect with staff.

3 APPLY BY FEBRUARY 10

If you wish to apply to an optional school, apply online at www.mnps.org/school-options or use the paper application at the back of this booklet. The random selection process in March will determine school admittance and waitlists. Late applications will be added to waitlists if a school is full or will be accepted at schools that have open seats. Families new to MNPS may apply year-round to optional schools with available seats. Families wanting to select a charter school may also apply year-round.

How the Optional Schools Process Works

Before You Apply

WHAT YOU NEED TO APPLY

- » The parent/guardian must be a Davidson County resident before submitting an Optional Schools Application for his/her child.
- » An MNPS-issued student identification (ID) number is required. Families can apply for a student ID number online at www.mnps.org/register-for-school. Student ID numbers may also be acquired at any of the district's eight enrollment centers.
- » The parent/guardian must have a valid email address or phone number to submit an application.



EXPLORE SCHOOL OPTIONS

To fully compare school options and make informed selections on the Optional Schools Application, families are strongly encouraged to engage with the schools that interest them, including their zoned school. Visit the school's website and social media pages or call the front office to learn about virtual events — an important step to ensure the climate, culture and educational offerings of a school will meet your child's needs.

A list of optional schools with open enrollment seats can be found on pages 13 and 14 of this booklet.



TRANSPORTATION

In most cases, school bus transportation is not provided to out-of-zone students attending optional schools. See the list of Frequently Asked Questions on page 5 for more details or check with individual schools to determine transportation availability.

Public bus transportation through WeGo Public Transit is provided at no cost to all high school students through the StrIDe program, where student ID cards double as city bus passes. The same program is available to middle school students attending an optional school, with the exception of charter middle schools. Parent permission for middle school students is required to receive a StrIDe bus pass. Learn more at www.mnps.org/transportation.



ATTENDANCE

Approval to continue enrollment in an out-of-zone school is given with the understanding that your student's attendance will comply with the district's attendance policy. Failure to comply with the attendance policy can result in revocation of placement in an out-of-zone school.



SPECIAL ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

The following schools have academic entrance requirements: Hume-Fogg High School, Martin Luther King Jr. School, Meigs Middle School and Early College High School. See pages 9 and 10 for additional details on the academic requirements for these schools.

The following schools require students to audition and/or interview: Isaiah T. Creswell Middle School of the Arts, Nashville School of the Arts and Nashville Big Picture High School. The schools will contact applicants to arrange auditions or interviews.

MNPS Virtual School also has admission criteria. Please contact the school for more information.

Filling Out the Application

- » Apply for up to seven schools on the application.
- » School choices must be prioritized from one (highest priority) to seven (lowest priority)—this includes pathway schools and all schools that require an interview or audition.
 - All applications are entered into a computerized random selection process.
 - If your child is selected to attend one of the schools on your application during the random selection process, you will be offered the opportunity to accept a seat in that school. The seat must be accepted or declined by the deadline.
 - Your child will be put on a waitlist for any schools that were listed higher on your priority list than the school where your child was selected to attend.
 - Your child will be "opted out" of any schools — including pathway schools — that were listed as a lower priority than the school where your child was selected to attend.
 - Families who list few options or only list schools in high demand may not be selected for any of the schools on their application.
 - When a family chooses not to accept a seat by the deadline date, that seat is made available to families on the waitlist in the order in which they are numbered.
 - Families will be "pulled" from the waitlist and offered an available seat at any time beginning March 25, 2023, through the fifth day of school in the 2023-2024 school year as seats become available.
 - Families will be notified of their selections by SMS, email and/or by USPS mail.

Submitting the Application

- » Families are encouraged to apply online at www.mnps.org/school-options. All changes to an existing application must be made online. If you need internet access, you may visit your nearest Nashville Public Library branch.
- » Paper applications (located at the back of this booklet) are accepted and must be returned to the Office of School Options.

- » Paper applications received by Feb. 10, 2023, at 4:30 p.m. CST will be entered into the random selection process. Online applications will be accepted until 11:59 p.m. CST on Feb. 10, 2023. All applications received after the deadline will be added to the end of the waitlist.
- » Continuation on a guaranteed pathway must be confirmed by returning your child's pre-printed pathway letter or submitting an application online. See Frequently Asked Questions on page 6 for more details.

MONDAY, JAN. 23, 2023

Applications Available

The Optional Schools Application will be available online at www.mnps.org/school-options for grades K-12. Printed applications will be available at schools, enrollment centers and the Family Information Center. Pathway continuation forms for students moving from elementary to middle or middle to high school on an approved pathway will be sent home.

FRIDAY, FEB. 10, 2023 BY 4:30 P.M. CST*

Application and Pathway Deadline

Families should return forms to the Office of School Options. Applications received by this deadline will be part of the random selection process on Selection Day. This deadline also includes all "pathway continuation forms" for students moving from elementary to middle or middle to high school on an approved pathway. Applications received after Friday, February 10, 2023 will be placed at the end of the waitlist. *This deadline does not apply to applicants for preschool, Pre-K, 11th or 12th grades.*

Frequently Asked Questions

WHO IS ELIGIBLE TO APPLY FOR OPTIONAL SCHOOLS?

Any student whose parent or guardian is a Davidson County resident at the time of application may apply.

DOES MY CHILD NEED A STUDENT ID NUMBER TO APPLY?

Yes. Every child enrolled in MNPS is required to have a nine-digit student ID number that begins with 190. The student ID number for current students can be found on the child's report card or requested at the child's school. An ID number for a new student can be acquired online at www.mnps.org/register-for-school or at one of the district's eight enrollment centers by presenting the child's birth certificate along with parent/guardian's proof of residency and a copy of your driver's license.

HOW DO I APPLY?

Families are encouraged to apply online at www.mnps.org/school-options. All families wishing to apply online must create a parent profile that requires a username and password. The username must be a valid phone number or email address. If you need assistance with setting up an email address, please contact the Family Information Center at 615-259-INFO(4636). Free internet access is available at your nearest Nashville Public Library or the MNPS Family Information Center, located at 2601 Bransford Ave., Nashville, TN 37204.

Paper applications can be submitted in person or by mail. If mailing your application, obtain a "Return Receipt Requested" form from the U.S. Postal Service. It is the responsibility of parents to make sure that the Office of School Options receives the application. If mailed without a return receipt, the district cannot verify receipt of the application. **Faxed applications will not be accepted.**

HOW DOES THE SELECTION PROCESS WORK?

A random computerized selection will be held to fill available seats in schools listed in this application (see pages 13-14). Only applications submitted and completed by the deadline of Feb. 10, 2023, will be included in the random selection process.

Results from the random selection process will be available on Selection Day, March 6, 2023. Selection Day results will be posted online at www.mnps.org and also available by contacting the Family Information Center at 615-259-INFO(4636). Your child's Selection Day results will be mailed March 8, 2023, to the address provided on the application.

School choices must be prioritized on the application from 1 (highest priority) to 7 (lowest priority). If your child is

selected for a seat at a school, you will be notified via SMS, email or you will receive an acceptance letter in the mail, which must be returned by March 24, 2023. You may also accept your child's seat online and receive confirmation.

If your child is not selected for a particular school, he or she will be placed on a waitlist for the 2023-2024 school year, unless the school was listed lower on your priority list than a school where your child was offered a seat. Your child will be "opted out" of any schools, including guaranteed pathway schools, that were listed lower on your priority list than a school that your child was selected to attend. This process is designed to give families the option of attending their highest-ranked school where space is available. Please note that all waitlists for non-charter schools in grades K-12 are dissolved after the first five attendance days of school.

Once a student has accepted a seat at an optional school, his or her name will be removed from any currently attended or previously accepted school for the 2023-2024 school year. **Students must attend school on the first day or they will be considered a "no-show" and their seat will be filled by another student from the waitlist.**

Applicants in the 11th and 12th grade go through a transcript review process for admission to available seats. All completed applications with transcript review documentation must be received on or before March 10, 2023, to be part of the random selection process. The random selection results will be available on March 24, 2023.

A separate random selection process will be held for Pre-K seats in spring 2023. A separate application is required to apply for a preschool and Pre-K seat in all schools, including Stanford Montessori and Hull-Jackson Montessori.



DO I NEED TO RE-APPLY EVERY YEAR TO STAY IN AN OPTIONAL SCHOOL?

No. Current K-12 students do not have to re-apply to remain enrolled in their current optional school. In May, your child will receive a verification/continuation letter from his or her school to confirm his or her seat assignment for the 2023-2024 school year. No action is needed if your child is moving from one grade to the next in the same school. Do not complete a new application. Current Pre-K students must re-apply for kindergarten even if they have been placed by Exceptional Education or through the Pre-K lottery process. Students attending Hull-Jackson Montessori and Stanford Montessori DO NOT have to re-apply.

Approval to continue enrollment in an out-of-zone school is given with the understanding that your student's attendance will comply with the district's attendance policy. Failure to comply with the attendance policy can result in revocation of placement in an out-of-zone school.

DOES MY CHILD HAVE A GUARANTEED PATHWAY ON TO MIDDLE / HIGH SCHOOL IF HE OR SHE ATTENDS AN OPTIONAL SCHOOL?

All MNPS students have a guaranteed pathway to their zoned school. For students attending an optional school outside their zone, there are some additional guaranteed pathways (see list in following question below). However, due to capacity constraints, the district cannot guarantee pathways into all of the zoned middle and high schools for out-of-zone students who attend those schools through open enrollment. If your child is out-of-zone attending an optional elementary or middle school that is not listed as having a pathway, then your child will need to apply by the deadline for the zoned feeder school and will be provided priority based on space availability. This is defined as "cluster preference." If the zoned feeder school is not listed in this Optional Schools Application, this indicates the school does not have capacity to accept out-of-zone students and you will not be able to continue to this school.

DO I NEED TO APPLY IF MY CHILD IS IN AN OPTIONAL SCHOOL WITH A GUARANTEED PATHWAY TO ANOTHER OPTIONAL SCHOOL?

Yes. If this is your child's last year to attend a school listed here and you want him/her to continue in the guaranteed pathway listed, you must return a pathway continuation form, which will be sent home from your child's school. You may also confirm your pathway continuation by completing the Optional Schools Application online. The pathway continuation form or online application must be submitted by Feb. 10, 2023.

Elementary to Middle Pathways

- » Carter-Lawrence Elementary students who want to go to Rose Park Middle
- » Robert Churchwell Elementary students who want to go to John Early Middle

- » Hattie Cotton Elementary students who want to go to Stratford STEM Magnet School (Lower Campus)
- » Jones Elementary students who want to go to Haynes Middle
- » Lockeland Elementary students who want to go to East Nashville Middle
- » Sylvan Park Elementary students who want to go to Haynes Middle

Middle to High Pathways

- » Isaiah T. Creswell Middle School of the Arts students who want to go to Nashville School of the Arts (*limited to 30 seats*)
- » East Nashville Middle students who want to go to East Nashville High
- » Haynes Middle students who want to go to East Nashville High
- » Head Middle current sixth or eighth grade students who qualify to go to Martin Luther King Jr. School
- » John Early Middle students who qualify to go to Hume-Fogg High
- » LEAD Cameron students who want to go to LEAD Academy
- » Liberty Collegiate students who want to go to RePublic High
- » Meigs Middle students who qualify to go to Hume-Fogg High
- » Nashville Prep students who want to go to RePublic High
- » Rose Park Middle students who qualify to go to Martin Luther King Jr. School

There will be a summer pathway offered to students attending Head, Rose Park, John Early or Meigs middle schools who did not qualify in the fall and are now eligible to attend Martin Luther King Jr. School and Hume-Fogg High School based off of the 2022-2023 TCAP or Spring District Benchmark and a GPA of 80 or higher from the second, third and fourth nine weeks scores with no failing grades. Summer pathway notification will occur either in July or August after the State of Tennessee standardized testing scores are available. If you are expecting a pathway form after June and will be on vacation in July or August, please email schooloptions@mnps.org for more information.

MAY I APPLY FOR MORE THAN ONE OPTIONAL SCHOOL?

Yes, and families are encouraged to do so. You may apply for up to seven school options, prioritized in order of preference. Families who list few options or only schools in high demand may not be selected for any of the schools on their application.

WHAT IS A CHARTER SCHOOL?

Charter schools are publicly-financed, privately-operated schools. Based on current state law, all charter school operators in Tennessee must be nonprofit organizations.

CAN I APPLY TO A CHARTER SCHOOL WITH THIS APPLICATION?

Yes. You can apply any time throughout the year to the charter schools that choose to take part in the Optional Schools Application process. Some charter schools choose to use their own application process. Contact the school to apply to a charter school not included on the application.

WHAT HAPPENS IF MY APPLICATION IS INCOMPLETE?

Incomplete applications will not be accepted online or in person. If you submit an incomplete paper application by mail, it will not be processed. If your application is received after the Feb. 10, 2023, deadline, your child will not be included in the random selection process for grades K-10. All late applications (including late re-submitted applications) will be added to the end of the waitlist.

CAN FAMILIES APPLY TO PREKINDERGARTEN WITH THIS APPLICATION?

No. A separate application is required to apply for a Pre-K seat in all schools. This also includes all Stanford Montessori and Hull-Jackson Montessori preschool (3-year-olds) and Pre-K (4-year-olds) seats. A separate application and random selection process will be held for all Pre-K seats in the spring of 2023.

WHAT IS NEEDED TO APPLY IF I AM A RISING JUNIOR OR SENIOR IN HIGH SCHOOL?

All 11th and 12th grade applicants must provide a complete copy of their high school transcript, latest report card and optional schools application to the principal of the high school to which they are seeking to transfer. Principals will have up to three business days to review your child's transcript and application. Upon completion of the review, the principal will attach a signed review form to your child's optional schools application before you may submit the application. Applications may be submitted beginning January 23, 2023. All completed applications received by March 10, 2023, will be in the random selection process for rising juniors and seniors.

WHAT ARE THE ENTRANCE REQUIREMENTS FOR THE ACADEMIC MAGNET SCHOOLS?

A student must meet two requirements to qualify for entrance into an academic magnet school: academic grades and standardized test scores. Please see pages 9 and 10 for complete details on the 2023-2024 requirements.

WHAT IS THE SELECTION PROCESS FOR SPECIALTY SCHOOLS?

Nashville School of the Arts (NSA) and Isaiah T. Creswell Middle School of the Arts require students to audition. NSA and Isaiah T. Creswell Middle School of the Arts will notify all applicants about times for auditions. NSA will hold 30 seats for qualifying students who will transition from Isaiah T. Creswell Middle School of the Arts. Students applying to these schools must include them in the list of prioritized schools in their application.

Nashville Big Picture High School requires students to interview. The school will contact applicants to arrange interviews. Early College High School also has academic requirements (see page 9).

MNPS Virtual School also has academic requirements and requires applicants to submit a video. To see specific requirements, visit the school's website.

HOW DOES SIBLING PREFERENCE WORK?

Sibling preference is given to students who have a sibling attending the school to which they are applying, as long as the sibling will still be at the school in the 2023-2024 school year.

Additionally, when two siblings apply to the same school (but different grade level) and only one sibling is selected, if the parent accepts the seat, the sibling that did not get selected will be moved to the sibling priority waitlist. A student with sibling preference will be offered a seat from the waitlist when a vacancy becomes available.

The following schools do not have sibling preference: East Nashville Magnet High School, East Nashville Middle School, Head Middle School, Hume-Fogg High School, Isaiah T. Creswell Middle School of the Arts, Martin Luther King Jr. School, Meigs Middle School, the Early College High School, MNPS Virtual School, Nashville School of the Arts and Rose Park Middle School. All other schools, including charter schools, do have sibling preference.

WHAT IS A GEOGRAPHIC PRIORITY ZONE (GPZ)?

A geographic priority zone (GPZ) gives admission preference to families who live in a defined geographic area around an optional school. Admission is not guaranteed for families located in a GPZ. However, they do receive priority placement during the random selection process. Use the Zone Finder tool online at www.mnps.org or call 615-259-INFO(4636) to determine if you are located in a GPZ for a school.

WHAT IS CLUSTER PREFERENCE?

Some optional schools offer admission preference to families living within a geographic high school cluster. Additionally, out-of-zone students attending an optional school who wish to continue in the zoned feeder pathway will receive admission preference if the feeder school is an

optional school. Parents must apply before the application deadline to receive cluster preference.

WHAT ARE THE REQUIREMENTS FOR ADMISSION INTO KINDERGARTEN?

Students eligible for kindergarten must be 5 years of age on or before Aug. 15, 2023. If your child will turn 5 years of age between Aug. 16, 2023, and Sept. 30, 2023, you may contact MNPS to ask about Kindergarten Readiness testing by calling 615-259-INFO(4636). Students with eligible Kindergarten Readiness Assessment scores can submit an optional schools application. Students who do not meet the cut off scores can apply for Pre-K.

WHAT ARE THE REQUIREMENTS FOR GLENDALE SPANISH IMMERSION?

- » Any student entering kindergarten or first grade may apply for Glendale.
- » Applicants in second and third grade will be required to pass a language proficiency test before being accepted to the school.
- » No applications will be accepted for fourth and fifth grade.

HOW LONG CAN A STUDENT REMAIN ON A WAITLIST?

Students in grades K-12 are kept on waitlists through the fifth day of school in the 2023-2024 school year. After the fifth day, the waitlists are eliminated with the exception of charter schools. Charter school waitlists continue throughout the entire school year.

IS THERE TRANSPORTATION FOR OPTIONAL SCHOOLS?

In most cases, school bus transportation is not provided to schools offered in the Optional Schools Application. Transportation is provided to students living in the geographic priority zone (GPZ) for Glendale Elementary Spanish Immersion School. In addition, several charter schools provide transportation. Contact individual schools to determine transportation availability.

Public bus transportation through WeGo Public Transit is provided at no cost to all high school students through the StriDe program, where student ID cards double as city bus passes. The same program is available to middle school students attending an optional school with the exception of charter middle schools. Parent permission for middle school students is required to receive a StriDe bus pass. Parents may contact WeGo customer service by calling 615-862-5960 or visit www.nashvillemta.org to plan a route and view WeGo availability.

Academic Magnet Entrance Requirements for 2023-2024

ACADEMIC GRADE AVERAGE AND SUBJECT SPECIFICATIONS

- » Students must have an academic average of 80 or above for all subjects combined for the spring semester of the previous school year and the first grading period (whether six weeks or nine weeks) of the current school year, with no failing grades for any grading period (whether six weeks or nine weeks) in this time frame.
- » Students attending Head, John Early, Meigs and/or Rose Park middle schools and who are applying for an eligible summer pathway must have an academic average of 80 or above for all subjects combined for the second, third and fourth nine weeks of the current school year, with no failing grades for any grading period (whether six weeks or nine weeks) in this time frame and meet the testing requirements from the 2022-2023 TCAP or Spring District Benchmark assessment.

TESTING REQUIREMENTS FOR ELIGIBILITY

- » For entrance into a magnet school with academic entrance requirements during the 2023-2024 school year, a student can meet the assessment requirements as follows:
 - Students applying to Meigs Middle School, Martin Luther King Jr. School or Hume-Fogg High School for the 2023-2024 school year will meet the test score requirement with 2022 TCAP scores of *Met Expectations* or *Exceeded Expectations* in English/Language Arts (ELA) and Math or with 2022 TCAP state stanine scores that total 14 or higher. An English Learner will meet the requirement with a score equivalent to *Met Expectations* or *Exceeded Expectations* in either of the two subjects. Fourth and eighth grade students may also meet the test score requirement with an academic magnet qualifying score on identified portions of the December, 2022, District Benchmark ELA and Math assessments.
 - For Early College High School, the minimum score for incoming 9th and 10th grade students is a sum of 10 stanine and/or *Met Expectations* or *Exceeded Expectations* in TCAP ELA and Math combined.
 - Incoming 11th grade applicants to Early College High School must have:
 - a minimum score of 21 on the ACT or
 - a minimum score of the below on the SAT
 - › 490 in English
 - › 500 in math
 - › 500 in critical reading

THE FOLLOWING SCHOOLS HAVE ACADEMIC ENTRANCE REQUIREMENTS:

- MEIGS MIDDLE SCHOOL (*grades 5-8*)
- MARTIN LUTHER KING JR. SCHOOL (*grades 7-12*)

DAVIDSON COUNTY STUDENTS WHO ARE NEW TO MNPS

A Davidson County student who is new to MNPS, the state of Tennessee, is currently a home school student, and/or currently enrolled in a private school may qualify with the following:

- » Meeting the academic grade average and subject specifications as stated above.
 - If a student has not taken a 2022 TCAP or the 2022-2023 MNPS District Benchmark assessments, scores on a recent (2021-22 or later) nationally normed achievement test that total 14 national stanine or higher for Reading/Language Arts and Math will meet the testing requirement. If a student does not have a recent test score for any of these assessments, parents may choose to pay for a privately administered nationally normed achievement test. However, private testing results will only be accepted when no other recent test scores are available.

ENGLISH LEARNERS

- » English learners who are currently enrolled in MNPS can meet the standardized test requirement with just one subject instead of two: either Reading/English/Language Arts or Math.

- » For entrance into academic magnets during the 2023-2024 school year, an English learner (EL) student can meet the assessment requirements in any one of the following ways:
 - An EL student will meet the requirement with a score of Met Expectations or Exceeded Expectations in ELA or Math on the 2022 TCAP assessment.
 - An EL student will meet the requirement with a TCAP state stanine of 7 or higher in either ELA or Math.
 - A fourth or eighth grade EL student will meet the requirement with a qualifying score in ELA or Math on the Winter, 2022, District Benchmark assessments.
 - An EL student who is new to MNPS or perhaps even new to Tennessee and who does not have TCAP or District Benchmark scores can qualify by submitting test results from a nationally normed achievement test. For Meigs Middle School, Martin Luther King Jr. School and Hume-Fogg High School, a score of 7 national stanine or above for either Reading/Language/Arts and/or Math will qualify. For Early College High School, a national stanine score of 5 or above will qualify.

Definitions of Academic Options, Themes & Programs

ACADEMIES OF NASHVILLE

Recognized by the White House as a national high school transformation model, the Academies of Nashville provide students with one of the best college and career prep programs in the nation. Students have a choice of 35 different academies within the largest 12 neighborhood high schools offering a practical, hands-on approach to learning in fields that interest them, ranging from engineering to healthcare with over 400 business and community partners. All Academy pathways are aligned with early college credit opportunities thanks to partnerships with local postsecondary institutions. Students also have the opportunity to earn industry certifications that make them competitive in a knowledge- and skills-based economy. ADVANCED ACADEMICS

Metro Schools offers a continuum of advanced academic programs for students Pre-K through 12th grade that builds upon students' individual strengths and maximizes academic potential for all learners. Our programming includes:

Advanced Placement (AP)

AP focuses on college-level instruction and assessment through an approved teacher syllabus. AP students have the opportunity to dig deeper into subjects that interest them, develop advanced research and communication skills, learn creative problem-solving and engage in rigorous college-level work. Various AP classes are available at each MNPS high school for any student who would like to engage in courses of high rigor. Students have additional options to enroll in virtual, asynchronous AP courses through AP Access for All.

Cambridge International

Cambridge students build more than just a deep understanding of their subject. They also develop higher order thinking skills so they can apply what they've learned. Cambridge students will be asked to think critically, to learn how to construct an argument and evaluate evidence. Students will also develop an international outlook and become confident, global citizens. Cambridge culminates with an advanced diploma and certification option for 10, 11th and 12th graders with college level coursework and assessments.

Dual Credit

Students are enrolled in a high school course that is identified as a match with a post-secondary course. Students complete a college assessment at the end of the course to prove mastery of content. If a student passes the test, they can use the college credit at that institution or request a transcript to use at a different institution.

Dual Enrollment

Students are dually enrolled in both college and high school courses. They must meet college admission requirements and complete all coursework. If a student passes the course, he/she will be awarded the college credit via a transcript.

Gifted and Talented Education (GATE)

The Gifted and Talented Program provides opportunities for gifted and talented students in grades K to 8 to participate in classes designed specifically for academically gifted and talented learners. The curriculum is hands-on, interactive, and problem-based with a focus on developing students' critical and creative thinking abilities. Instruction is interdisciplinary and aligned with Tennessee content standards.

Industry Credential

Students complete the aligned industry credential assessment at the end of the course to prove mastery of content and potentially earn college credit.

International Baccalaureate (IB)

IB emphasizes a constructivist approach based on inquiry and focused on conceptual understanding. Learning is contextualized, collaborative and differentiated to meet the needs of learners. Through deliberate strategies and attitudes, students will explore thinking, communication, social, self-management and research skills. IB culminates with an advanced diploma and certification option for 11 and 12th graders with college level coursework and assessments.

ADVANCEMENT VIA INDIVIDUAL DETERMINATION (AVID)

AVID's mission is to close the opportunity gap by preparing all students for college readiness and success in a global society. AVID's one guiding principle is to hold students accountable to the highest standards, while providing academic and social support. Students who enroll in AVID are expected to partner this class with courses of high rigor.

EARLY COLLEGE HIGH SCHOOL OPPORTUNITIES

Through an early college high school program, admitted students can fast track their college plans or begin building a career by simultaneously earning a high school diploma and college associate's degree in just four years — and at no cost to families. The program offers a rigorous curriculum providing higher education and industry partnership experiences for students. The application process is open to current eighth graders who will enter high school as ninth graders in the 2023-2024 school year. Two MNPS schools offer an early college program. Early College High School, located on the campus of Nashville State Community College, has a total of 100 seats available for qualified applicants. Current ninth graders may also apply. Students will be responsible for their own transportation to and from the school. Whites Creek High School also offers an Early College program, as well as traditional high school programming. Students who are zoned to WCHS will have transportation provided. Students who live outside the Whites Creek zone are responsible for their own transportation.

MAGNET PROGRAMS

Magnet schools are visionary, innovative schools where students are attracted by their unique themes such as STEAM, Arts, IB and more. Magnet schools seek to attract a diverse student body where highly engaging learning occurs. Soft skills, teamwork, acceptance, innovation and engagement make magnet schools a vibrant environment to develop children prepared for future careers and successful community engagement. This real-life preparation has students not only interacting with peers from all backgrounds, but with hands-on experience working with businesses, cultural institutions, universities and community organizations. 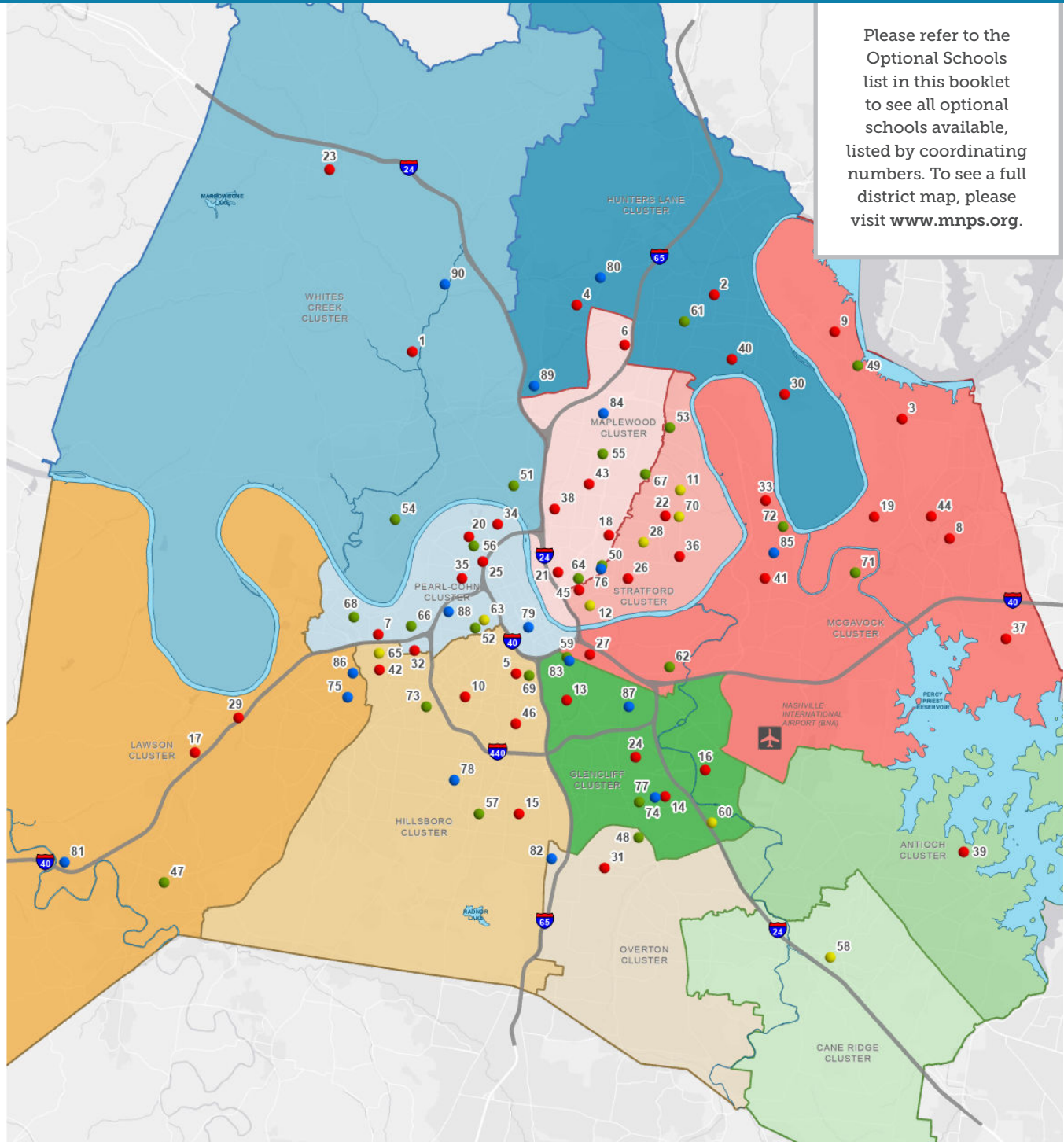
